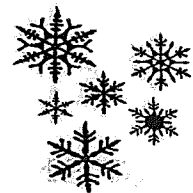

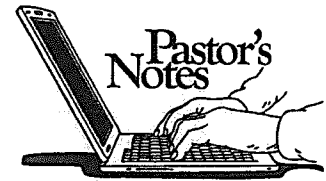

Dear St. Paul members and friends,



You may remember that we met for three days of prayer in the sanctuary last January. As we gathered almost a year ago, little did we conceive of the tumultuous year 2020 would be! The heart-wrenching stories across our nation and even in our own community that unfolded day after day left us stunned at times and at other times too numb to react.

Now it is late 2020 or early 2021, depending on when you read this. As I write, things are still chaotic and disconcerting. Hopefully, by God's grace, things will turn around during the new year.

I'm calling every member/attendee of St. Paul Evangelical Lutheran Church, Clyde to prayer again. This time we will not meet in the Sanctuary but in the Youth Room in the lower level of the building, January 5-7, 2021, 9:00 am to 9:30 am.

We will be praying in spirit with our fellow believers in the LCMC (Lutheran Congregations in Mission for Christ), now 300,000 members strong, with 954 local congregations. The LCMC now ranks as fourth largest Lutheran body in the United States. The LCMC is in full communion and partnership with the NALC.

I am calling every member to prayer. If you can't make it physically, please pray during that time privately if you are able. If you work at that time, please choose another time slot during those three days to pour out your heart in prayer to our gracious heavenly Father. If you would like to join in prayer via Zoom, please let me know via personal conversation, email (pastor@stpaulclyde.org, or padrekurterik@gmail.com, or phone at 503-522-0216 or 419-547-9225. I will send you an invitation so you may login.

There is power in prayer. The Church of the Apostles met daily in Jerusalem for fellowship and prayer (Acts 2:42), and you know the dynamic missionary spirit that church possessed! Let's just meet for three days in January for a half-hour. The Lord knows there are so many things to pray about right now that every minute should be filled with prayer and we will not have touched the surface! Let's meet together either in person or via Zoom and see what the Lord will do through this.

Since most of you don't receive the LCMC quarterly magazine "By The Word," I included the article below from there, written by Mike Bradley, the new Service Coordinator, regarding the Three Days of Prayer for your thoughtful perusal.

Three Days of Prayer

Our Lord Jesus is our model for all things in life and faith. With that in mind it is important to note how intentional He was in making time to be with God the Father and to pray (see Mark 1:35). These were such important priorities for Jesus that He even refused to allow the ever-present needs of people to deter Him from making time to pray. Jesus was intentional when it came to prayer.

Following our Lord's example, we are setting aside an intentional time to pray together across our association on **January 5-7, 2021**. LCMC's **Three Days of Prayer** is a designated time for us to come together as one across the association to pray. It is not the only time we pray of course. It is, however, a time when we can be united around a common purpose, one modeled for us by our Lord and Savior.

As we join together on these days in January, we will be able to pray with confidence knowing that our prayers are not dependent upon us but rather upon the character and power of the One to whom we pray.

LCMC Pastor Graeme Sellers writes: "God does not want us to find our confidence in prayer in how well or how right we're praying; but rather, in our conviction of His goodness and kindness to His kids."

This assurance of the love and goodness of our Father in Heaven sets us free to pray. We do not have to be paralyzed nor stymied in prayer, waiting until we think we have prayed right enough, good enough, long enough. Rather, we are set free to pray in confidence knowing to whom it is we pray, our good Father in Heaven who is determined to be good to us.

Let's come together across the association to pray during these three days in January and let's pray every day before and after. Let us pray as God has taught us in the form of the Lord's Prayer. Let us pray as prompted by the Word and the Spirit of God. Let us pray that the Holy Spirit bring us together as one so that millions can be drawn by God to faith in Jesus Christ as Savior and Lord. And let us pray to the Lord as others have done throughout history: "Lord, do whatever You need to do in us so You can do whatever You want to do through us." For Yours Lord, is the Kingdom, power, and the glory forever and ever. Amen.

Up the Odds That Kids Listen When You Talk

Have you noticed that shortly after you start talking about something important with your kid, you end up in lecture mode? Particularly when we try to talk to them about being more responsible, eating green stuff, getting a good education, staying away from all things that might “put your eye out,” etc.

Unfortunately, it's a proven fact that the more words we use, the less effective we become. So how do we pass on our mass amounts of wisdom as parents? Glad you asked! Try asking questions instead of giving lectures. This shows our kids that we want to understand their viewpoint as well as it forces them to do most of the thinking. Even when our kids don't answer our questions verbally, their subconscious minds can't resist the urge to solve our questions. Asking their thoughts also dramatically increases the odds that they'll listen when it's our turn to speak. Try some of these:

- What do you think about how you're doing in school right now?
- What are your ideas on whether bikes, like your new one, are ever stolen?
- What are your thoughts on kids experimenting with drugs?
- How do you think some kids put themselves in danger while chatting on the internet?

Let's think about this. Do children have control over whether they listen to us? Do you remember any lectures you endured that truly changed how you behaved? Do stubborn kids know they can turn their ears off? (Did you notice how you had to slow down and think about what you read in this paragraph because there were questions?) Whenever we pretend to have control over things we clearly do not, it erodes kids respect for us and creates a battle they cannot resist.

We all know at least one child, or adult, who has to learn life's lessons the hard way. Despite all our efforts to bestow our wisdom upon them, them with they choose to take the rocky road filled with many mistakes. There are moments we must speak up. When you have no choice but to lecture, here are a few tips to experiment with:

- Have plenty of short discussions rather than a few long ones.
- Ask open-ended questions that are thoughtful and sincere.
- Ask permission to share your thoughts.
- Describe potential consequences by saying “Some kids worry about...”
- Don't force kids into a conversation when they refuse to talk.

Here's to wiser kids, saner parents, and stronger families.

Applying Bible Principles

“ . . . ask, and it will be given to you; seek and you will find; knock and it will be opened to you” (Luke 11:9).

God has a wonderful “system” by which we as His children are to get our needs met. It’s a very simple “system,” but somehow, we fail to utilize it as we should. Here’s the plan: God says we are to ask Him. Is that simple or what? We are to call unto Him, to cry out our needs before Him, to bring our petitions before His throne. But somehow, we must think His plan is too complex, for with most of us, asking God is the last thing we do when we have needs.

Oh, we’ll tell our friends. We’ll discuss our needs with any and all who have the patience and courtesy to listen. We’ll frequently complain about our problems, even to the extent of sometimes holding God responsible for His seeming failure to provide for us. But ask God? Usually we’ll do that only as a last resort.

The result is a sad state of affairs among Christians. “You want something but don’t get it. . . .You do not have, because you do not ask God. When you ask, you do not receive, because you ask with wrong motives, that you may spend what you get on your pleasures” (James 4:2-3). So our needs go unmet because either we do not ask or we ask with wrong motives.

J. Irvin Overholtzer was a pastor who was greatly used by God as the founder of Child Evangelism Fellowship. His philosophy of providing for the financial needs of this world-wide organization was this: “Ask God . . . and tell His people.” Yes, we need to share our needs with others. We ought to make others aware of opportunities for them to get involved in being used of God to meet those needs. But the *first* step in the entire process is this: “Ask God.”

And when we do, we can claim His promise stated so clearly in Jeremiah 33:3 — “Call to me and I will answer you and tell you great and hidden things you have not known.”

Say, do you have needs in your life today? Why not “ask God”? Why not come boldly to His throne? Why not take Him at His Word and “call” to Him? That’s God’s plan for His children: “ . . . ask and it will be given to you; seek and you will find; knock and it will be opened to you” (Luke 11:9). Or as Eliza Hickock wrote a century ago, “I know not by what methods rare, but this I know: God answers prayer!”

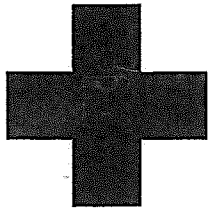
30 pair of used eyeglasses were shipped to "New Eyes for the Needy" in December 2020. Keep saving those used eyeglasses and stamps!

Looking forward to the many blessings God will bestow upon us in 2021!

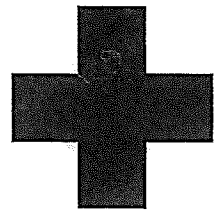

2021 OFFERING ENVELOPES

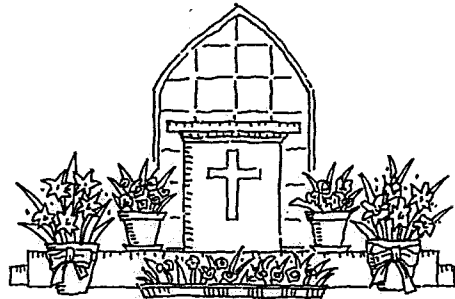

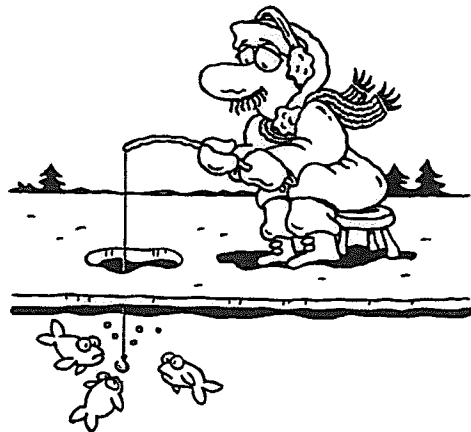
ALTAR FLOWERS CHART

The altar flower chart for the year 2021 is now on the double doors in the Parish Hall.

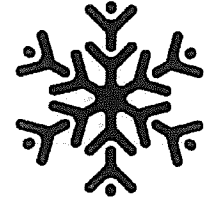
If you would like to have flowers placed on the altar “in honor” or “in memory” of someone, please sign the appropriate date on the chart.
